## Checkpoint 1: Immigration




Look for the Non-U.S. Citizen/Visitors line
Have your documents ready:

- 1. I-20
- 2. SEVIS fee receipt
- 3. Passport and Visa
- 4. Customs Declaration Form
- 5. Other supporting documents for your stay in United States (if applicable)

Tips: cellphone and camera usage is not permitted before passing through immigration

# Questions to expect from the Immigration Officer





What is your country of origin?
Where is your final destination?
Why are you here?
What are you studying?
Who's paying for you?
Where will you be living?



Once you are cleared, the officer will ask for you fingerprints and take your photo.

Tips: Immigration officers can be quite intimidating and demanding, stay calm and answer their questions to the best of your ability. Provide short and firm answers. Do not provide any extra information.

## In case of secondary inspection:

- Secondary inspections can take two hours to several hours depends the information the office would like to explore.
- If you are being picked up from the airport, make sure to let the person know of this possibility as cellphone use is not allowed during inspections.
- Refer to your I-20 package for additional information to prepare for immigration inspection

# Checkpoint 2: Baggage Claim



Look for your flight number and what carousel your baggage will be arriving on, look up to find this on a small monitor, or listen to announcements made through the PA system.

Retrieve your baggage

Tips: special sized baggage will be placed in the aisle nearest your carousel

## Checkpoint 3: Customs













Have your blue Customs
Declaration form in hand,
ready to pass to the
Customs Officer at the
end of the line.



This Officer will decide whether they will conduct a bag search, or they will let you exit into California.

When you have retrieved all your luggage, you will fall into another line in order to exit. This line leads to your final checkpoint, customs.

#### Welcome to California!

Is someone picking you up at the Arrival Gate?



There is no free Wi-Fi service at the arrival gate. Pay phones are located at either ends of the arrival hall. Only quarters (25c) are accepted.

Is someone picking you up outside?



If someone is picking you up outside, agree on a specific airline sign to stand under. Popular choices: Cathay Pacific, Korean Air, Air Canada, United Airlines

Tips for planning prior to arrival:

Have contact numbers copied down in case that person can't find you, is running late, or can't be there. Make a backup plan before you arrive.

## **Airport Transition Options:**

Los Angeles Airport FlyAway

If someone wants to pick you up closer to their homes,

consider: LAX FlyAway

#### LAX → Major Metro Stations

- Expo/ La Brea (Los Angeles)
- Union Station (Downtown Los Angeles)
- Van Nuys (San Fernando Valley)
- Westwood (West Los Angeles)

Where to catch it: Lower/Arrival Level, under green FlyAway, Buses and Long Distance Van sign



How to buy a ticket: Purchase ticket on the bus with Visa, Mastercard, or American Express (cash is not accepted)



#### John Wayne Airport and Santa Anna Public Transit

- Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA) Route 76, and the i Shuttle, Route A, service John Wayne Airport. Their bus stop is located on the Arrival (lower) Level, curbside, in front of Terminal B.
- The nearest train stations are located in Irvine, Santa Ana and Tustin, all approximately 10 miles from John Wayne Airport. The closest Greyhound stop is located in the Santa Ana train station. The iShuttle, Route A, connects the Tustin Metrolink Station to John Wayne Airport via Von Karman Avenue.

#### San Diego Airport Public Transportation

- City Bus Public transit is available to and from the Airport and downtown San Diego on the Metropolitan Transit System's Route 922, which stops at Terminals 1 and 2, and operates between 5:00 a.m. and 11:30 p.m., every 15 minutes on weekdays and every 30 minutes on weekends and holidays.

## Airport Transportation Option: Share Ride Vans for All Airports

Share ride vans are essentially like a taxi providing door to door service, the only difference is that you will be sharing the van with others along the same route, so there may be detours before you each your destination.

# Delivery Apps

- If you are tired from your travels and don't feel like going out to eat don't worry! Most restaurants in California deliver.
- If the restaurant of your choice does not deliver try one of these delivery apps. A majority of restaurants participate in these services and you can get your food delivered right to your door for a small fee. Most of these apps also offer deals for first time users.
